A brief introduction on Sunday's readings

First reading Sirach 15:15-21

Life is a matter of having to choose and in the words of a twentieth century writer, we are “condemned” to be free. Freedom here is not wilful choosing but real interior freedom of heart.

Second reading 1 Cor 2:6-10

As believers, we stand before the great mystery of God, greater than our minds, greater than our hearts. And yet, somehow, as St Paul teaches, we share in this mystery and God lives in us through the Spirit poured into our hearts.

Gospel Matthew 5:17-37

The Sermon on the Mount has entered world literature as a great synthesis of the teaching of Jesus. In today's reading from the Sermon, Jesus teaches a morality of the heart, that goes well beyond our eternal actions to the heart, the inner “sanctum” from which our actions spring. It is very searching and, as we know, very true.

You have heard it said but I say to you...

By Irish tradition, the feast of St Brigid marks the first day of spring. The cycle of time moves on and we are enjoying a little more daylight in spite of the rain. Change is the one constant in life and nothing really remains the same. Cardinal Newman once wrote: “To live is to change, and to be perfect is to have changed often.” Newman had in mind the Christian Church, always evolving and developing. The question arises again today as we walk the Synodal Pathway, initiated by Pope Francis and now in the hands of Pope Leo XIV. There are many proposals on the table: some are straight opposites and others are, putting in gently, in tension with the received tradition.

Across Christian history, both doctrines and ethics have evolved. An example of ethical development would be the relatively new social doctrine of the Catholic Church, asserting the equal dignity and rights of all and finally condemning, for example, slavery and human trafficking. Examples of doctrinal development would include the following: the Incarnation and the Trinity, the seven sacraments, the Eucharist, papal authority and a range of doctrines about Mary. Ecumenism, an innovation of the Protestant Churches, is now firmly part of Catholic teaching. In other words, the Catholic Church, for all its apparent resistance to change, actually practices the development of doctrine, as described by Cardinal Newman in his book of the same name. “To live is to change, and to be perfect is to have changed often.”

Reflections

1. In this section of the Sermon on the Mount Jesus proposes standards that go beyond external ways of behaviour but challenge how we feel in our hearts. When have you found that living out of inner conviction is more life-giving than keeping up appearances?

2. Jesus applies his teaching to feelings of anger and sexual desire. He suggests that if we do not keep an eye on our feelings and thoughts we will not be able to control our actions. Perhaps you have experienced the truth of this. What has helped you to integrate your feelings so that you were able to live in right relationship with yourself and others?

3. For Jesus, persons with genuine authenticity do not need to swear an oath to be convincing. Their ‘yes’ or ‘no’ suffices. Recall people who had this kind of credibility for you. When have you found that your simple, direct and honest communication had a positive persuasive force?

PRAYER

All-seeing God, you alone judge rightly our inmost thoughts. Teach us to observe your law from the heart even as we keep it outwardly. Purify our desires, calm every anger, and reconcile us to one another. Then will our worship at your altar render you perfect praise. We make our prayer through our Lord Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever. Amen.
