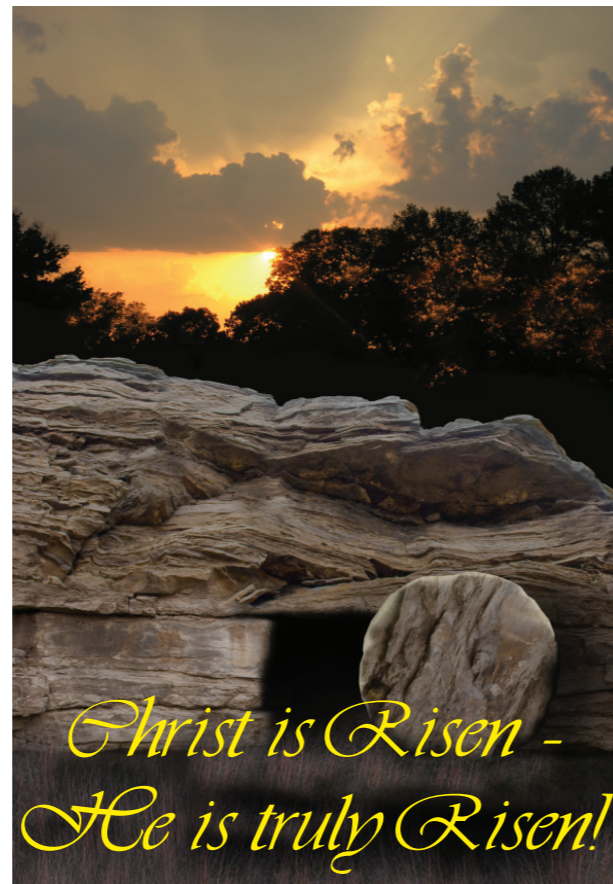
'Doubt no longer, but believe'

On this Second Sunday of Easter and Divine Mercy Sunday, we meet a very familiar friend in the disciple Thomas. We are all comfortable in his company because he says what we often think when we find it hard to believe without evidence. He says what the rest of us are thinking! The beauty of this dialogue with the Risen Jesus is the way in which he is received by Jesus. Jesus brings Thomas to belief by touch. It is not about convincing Thomas at a rational or academic level. Jesus 'meets' Thomas in his suffering and at a point which Thomas immediately grasps and understands.

It is a model for each of us this weekend. While we struggle at a level of reason and intellect yet we can immediately grasp the presence of the Risen Jesus in our suffering and pain. This weekend, we ask the Risen Jesus to take our hand and to place it into His side. We can touch the Risen Jesus in the Eucharist and receive the healing and belief we crave. Thoughts

Christ is risen! He is truly risen!

Years ago, a Dublin church had this poster: "I prefer living doubts to dead certainties"! Perhaps this is no bad introduction to the story of Doubting Thomas — living doubts do lead to different kind of faith. All of us, without distinction, are challenged today — what do I believe? how do I understand it? does it make a real difference? And so on. We all need an account of the hope that is in us — first of all for ourselves and only then, perhaps, for our companions on the road. In reality, faith and doubt are not mutually exclusive. We believe, we trust, precisely because we doubt... just like Thomas.

Reflections for Prayer

1. "Peace be with you" was the greeting of Jesus on meeting his frightened apostles. Who has come to you bringing peace at times when you were afraid? To whom have you been able to bring peace?
2. Thomas, doubting and questioning, is possibly a person with whom we can identify. What part have doubting and questioning played on your faith journey? How has your faith been strengthened by such moments?
3. Note the way that Jesus dealt with Thomas. He did not give out because he doubted. He accepted how he felt and led him along to see the truth of his resurrection. Who has been that kind of teacher for you, gently taking you where you were and leading you to a deeper knowledge about some truth about life? For whom have you been that kind of teacher?
4. "Blessed are they who have not seen and yet believed". That requires great trust. Perhaps you have had the experience of being trusted without having to justify every step along the way. What was it like to be trusted in that way? Who have you been able to trust in a similar manner?

PRAYER

God of life, source of all faith, through the waters of baptism you have raised us up in Christ and given us life that endures. Day by day, refine our faith that we who have not seen the Christ, may truly confess him as our Lord and God, and share the blessedness of those who believe. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.
