



# Some thoughts on today's Gospel.....


These sayings of Jesus, part of the great Sermon on the Mount, are among those which would eventually lead to his crucifixion. He is recalling the teaching of Moses, the great Law-giver, with the expression, "You have heard it was said of old...." But He now adds, "But I say to you..."

The implication here is that He is a more authoritative person than Moses. The influential leaders who were unsympathetic to the person of Jesus met his saving message with hostility. They were resistant to his preaching of a kingdom which demanded a higher standard of human conduct than that called for by Moses. Jesus is proclaiming a new era.

od, however, never commands what He does not empower us to do. Help is offered to us through grace, strengthening us to carry out what He asks of us. This empowerment is something to be asked for. "Ask and you will receive, seek and you will find, knock and the door will be opened to you". An old Irish saying here is appropriate: "The help of God is closer than the door".

#### **Observations**

The gospel for this Sunday — the very next part of the Sermon on the Mount — may feel both confining and freeing. Confining because of the emphatic affirmation of the full Law, the Torah. Freeing because the subsequent 6 antitheses (of which we hear 4) go beyond the Torah. As usual, some idea of the historical setting is a help.

The tragic "parting of the ways" with Judaism happened unevenly and not all at once. In the case of Matthew, he has two "events" in view: the destruction of the Temple and the later re-organisation of rabbinic Judaism. As a break-away Jewish sect, his community claims to be the authentic evolution of Judaism. Also, he may have been writing to a chiefly Jewish-Christian group, keen to assert it roots in the mother religion. At the same time, the subsequent antithesis are in tension with the tradition — throwing new light *from Jesus*, on what God is now asking of us. It seems the earlier big debate over circumcision etc. is now in the past and it is noticeable that Matthew never mentions it.

What to keep and what to discard — an issue every time the Church faced new challenges. The Continental Document of the Synodal Pathway reflects the tensions between tradition and modernity. Perhaps we can learn from Matthew to give priority to love, mercy and justice as we put new wine into new wineskins.

The teaching is pre- sented using various examples, pre- sented sometimes with great simplicity, other times with irony and wit.

- 1. In this section of the Sermon on the Mount Jesus proposes standards that go beyond external ways of behaviour but challenge how we feel in our hearts. When have you found that living out of inner conviction is more life-giving than keeping up appearances?
- 2. Jesus applies his teaching to feelings of anger and sexual desire. He suggests thatifwedonotkeepaneyeonour feelings and thoughts we will not be able to control our actions. Perhaps you have experienced the truth of this. What has helped you to integrate your feelings so that you were able to live in right rela-tionship with yourself and others?
- 3. For Jesus, persons with genuine au-thenticity do not need to swear an oath to be convincing. Their 'yes' or 'no' suffices. Recall people who had this kind of credibility for you. When have you found that your simple, direct and hon- est communication had a positive per- suasive force?

All-seeing God, you alone judge rightly our inmost thoughts. Teach us to ob- serve your law from the heart even as we keep it outwardly.

Purify our desires, calm every anger, and reconcile us to one another. Then will our worship at your altar render you perfect
