The Synodal Pathway of the Catholic Church in Irela

The Pastors, established by God as "authentic guardians, interpreters and witnesses of the faith of the whole Church,"should not be afraid to listen to the Flock entrusted to them. The consultation of the People of God does not imply the assumption within the Churchof the dynamics of democracy based on the principle of majority, because there is, at the basis of participation in every synodal process, a shared passion for the common mission of evangelization and not the representation of conflicting interests. In other words, this is an ecclesial process that can only take place "at the heart of a hierarchically structured community."It is in the fruitful bond between the sensus fidei of the People of God and the magisterial function of the Pastors that the unanimous consensus of the whole Church in the same faith is realized.

very synodal process, in which the Bishops are called to discern what the Spirit is saying to the Church, not by themselves but by listening to the People of God, who "shares also in Christ's prophetic office" (LG, no. 12), is an evident form of that "journeying together" which makes the Church grow. St. Benedict emphasizes how "the Lord often reveals the most prudent course to be followed" to those who do not occupy important positions in the community (in that case, the youngest); thus, the Bishops should take care to reach out to everyone, so that, in the orderly unfolding of the synodal journey, what the apostle Paul recommends to the communities may be realized: "Do not quench the Spirit. Do not despise prophetic utterances. Test everything; retain what is good" (1 Thess 5:19-21). #14

Inspiration

So how do we engage with the Word of the Lord in our time? A first step might to ask not how but why do we engage with such ancient texts? We do this regularly in no other setting and even though we are used to it, it is in its way slightly weird.

wo keys can help us here. The first is the intuition that fundamental human experiences do not really change that much across cultures and time. The second is a conviction that our ancients texts, in the words of Benedict XVI, are the "very voice of the pilgrim people of God." We read these ancient texts because they refract the spiritual experiences of generations before us and we hope that their refracted light can illuminate our own experience today.


We will keep you updated as we go along and the first undertaking will be the Parish Centre starting now.

Thought for the day

The parable of the sower is told twice, in an original form and in a later, church interpretation. The explanation tends to dominate our reading; but it might be worthwhile allowing the original parable to "speak." It tells of small, even careless, beginnings- the sower scatters all over the place. As we see in nature, tiny seeds have an astonishing, miraculous effect. Go back over your own experience and recall something which began modestly but which in the end grew surprisingly. The reign of God is like that - the modest beginnings of Jesus' own preaching had tremendous effect.

Reflections

1. Jesus uses parables to make people think about their own responses to his message. As you read this parable you may recognise that at different times you have been like each of the different types of soil. As you recall times when you presented fertile soil for the word of God, what helped you create that receptive atmosphere? What lessons for life do you get from that?

2. Parents with children, teachers with pupils, speakers with listeners, are all like sowers in a field where the preparation of the soil is up to another—the child, pupil or listener. They can sow the seed but cannot guarantee that it will bear fruit. At times there may be a temptation not to try any more. The challenge is to sow in hope. When have you been sur- prised by the harvest you have reaped?

3. "We are wasting our time here" may sometimes be the apparent wisdom in a group. Have there been times when you have gone against this apparent wisdom and seen your efforts bear fruit?

PRAYER

God of the heavens, God of the earth, all creation awaits your gift of new life. Prepare our hearts to receive the word of your Son, that his gospel may grow within us and yield a harvest that is a hundredfold.

Through Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God for ever and ever. Amen.
