Observations

pril is almost over and we are slowing moving into May. Even if the temperatures don't quite match, spring has definitely sprung and there is a sense of anticipation, new life in the air. In the community of faith too, we are experiencing a springtime in the synodal pathway, a beacon of hope.

All through Eastertide, we have been listening to the story of the church coming to birth in the Acts of the Apostles. The history is idealised, of course, but even Luke cannot hide the fact that all was not all sunshine and light. This is evident in many stories, including today's first reading. The recognition of Paul after all the harm he had done was not easy for everyone. The crisis over circumcision — apparently arcane to us — was really about the universality of the Church. What are the conditions of belonging?

Still, in the Acts of the Apostles, there is a remarkable energy and an enviable vitality. I would pick out three marks of the early church: they had something to say, many were really gifted people and they listened to and were guided by the Spirit.

For us in our time, the synod process is already well underway. The risk is always that it might just come and go and be a missed opportunity, a talking shop. It depends on us — all of us — to make our voices heard. The international one is already at the half way mark with the rest to come in the coming autumn. The international synod is obviously important.

No less important will be our own national synod, which will surely plot the direction of the church in Ireland for the foreseeable future. Jesus is the vine, but we are all the branches.

Reflections

1. In a relationship connectedness is important. Relationships cannot be taken for granted and need time and care to be life-giving. What does your experience tell you of the truth of this in your relationships with God, with your friends, with your family, with communities or groups to which you belong?

2. "Every branch that bears fruit he prunes to make it bear more fruit". In what ways do you see that you have been 'pruned' by the experiences of life, or by the word of God, to be a more fruitful person? Perhaps you have also experienced the need for "pruning" in significant relationships in your life.

3. The parable also reminds us that we are not the source of our own life. It is a gift from God, from our parents, and from all who have nourished us. Give thanks for those who have been a source of life for you.

4. God is glorified by our being fruitful. When has human fruitfulness reminded you of God at work in our world?


PRAYER

n the Bible, things from everyday life are used to speak of God. Two good examples would be those staples of the Mediterranean, the olive and the vine. By staying connected and with careful pruning, the fruit itself is "pleasant to the sight and good for food" (Genesis 2:9). No need to mention the wine!
