Isaiah 66:18-21 First reading

The in-gathering is a very appealing topic. Our first reading speaks of God gathering the Israel and the nations, so that together they might worship the same Lord.

Second reading **Hebrews 12:5-7**

What do we do with difficult experiences? We can ignore them or really try to make us of them, as suggested by this reading from Hebrews.

Luke 13:22-30 Gospel

Jesus' words and mission were not at all salways consoling: a "comfortable" Gospel is really a contradiction in terms and from time to time a shake-up is good for us.

Commentary

The passage is a powerful reminder that salvation is not a passive state but an active, lifelong pursuit. Bible scholars say that Jesus's teachings in this passage are not about earning salvation through works, but about the necessity of a transformed heart and a life that reflects that transformation. The "narrow door" symbolizes the exclusive nature of the path to salvation through Jesus Christ, emphasizing that true discipleship involves more than just outward appearances or religious rituals. The parable also serves as a warning against complacency and self-deception, urging individuals to examine their hearts and lives to ensure they are genuinely aligned with God's will. The emphasis on weeping and gnashing of teeth serves as a stark reminder of the consequences of rejecting God's offer of salvation.

The Bible and what is happening in Gaza

t is hard not to overstate what is happening in Gaza: the destruction of the territory, the starvation and attempted genocide of the people. All this is done in the name of biblically inspired "nationalism". As such, it has made many people very, very uncomfortable with overt nationalist passages in the readings from the Bible. This is so much the case that an Israeli Jesuit of Jewish background, David Neuhaus, has written a short article with a trenchant title: "Reading the Bible after the Destruction of Gaza." In the words of Neuhaus: This causes the Bible to be frowned upon by those who fight for freedom, equality, and fraternity.

To people perhaps not so familiar with the Bible, today's first reading from Isaiah must come as something of a surprise. It offers a vision of all nations coming to worship the one, true God. The reading comes from the last part of Isaiah, usually called Third Isaiah, written after the return from the great Exile in Babylon. In spite of that setting, the reading breathes a broader, more universal air.

This slightly exotic text is a reminder that in the Bible there are not one but two narratives of salvation. The first one, perhaps more familiar, is unapologetically nationalist, often harshly expressed. It is the story of the ancient Israelites, later the Jewish people. The second one, perhaps less apparent, offers a different story, the story of all the nations and their inclusion in God's plan of salvation.

Reflections

1. The question put to Jesus is one that many still ask: "Will many be saved?" In his answer Jesus is not concerned about numbers but warns his listeners about complacency. Just as his listeners could not regard the mere fact of being Jews as sufficient for salvation, neither can we regard being Christians as enough. That entitlement will come from our acceptance of Jesus. For any relationship to be alive – either with god or with another human person – the real question is "Is my heart in this relationship?" What does your experience tell you of

2. "Strive to enter by the narrow door". Jesus himself is on his journey to Jerusalem, purposeful and determined. True followers of him will also be purposeful and determined. That is true in any journey, career, or relationship if there is to be growth or progress. What it is like for you when you fail to do this? What is it like for you when the effort is there?

To the banquet of your kingdom, O God of the nations, you have invited people of every race and tongue. May all who are called to a place at your table come, by the narrow way, to the unending feast of life.

OThese gifts, on the other hand, should not trigger a kind of lazy confidence but should invite even greater engagement, commitment and costly discipleship. God desires the whole person, all that I am.
