

First reading Isaiah 2:1-5

As a new church year opens, our first reading is a clarion call to start again and set out on the pilgrimage of faith fresh vision and energy. The marvellous image of transforming weapons of war into instruments of agriculture speaks in every age.

Second reading Romans 13:11-14

It is possible to sleepwalk through life and find ourselves somehow settling for less, perhaps at a very material level. Paul will have none of it. This is not a rehearsal, this is the only performance and it is time to wake up!

Matthew 24:37-44 Gospel

The Gospel invites us not to postpone living fully until some future, unreal moment, but to start in real time, now, today. As St Paul puts it, See, now is the acceptable time; see, now is the day of salvation! (2Corinthians 6:2)
